Instruments

Planning

Music is planned progressively, using the National Curriculum and 'Key Skills' from our BJA Curriculum. It is taught in each term and is linked to other areas of the curriculum and the overall topic theme, as appropriate. The musical elements and notation are progressively introduced and discussed. Music is taught weekly and all lessons are delivered by a music specialist. We feel it is important for the pupils to learn about, in and through music.

Assessment

Progress and achievement is recorded in the 'Skills Journal' which details the key skills for music taught at BJA. This is an ongoing record for the four years that the child is a pupil at Branston Junior Academy. Each term, all pupils are involved in a 'Celebrate Our Learning Day' (PUPIL VOICE) when they have the opportunity to discuss and inform the Subject Leader about their learning in music.

Extra Curr Opps

A choir, Ocarina club and Handbell Club provide opportunities for both gifted/ talented musicians and 'enthusiastic musicians' . These provide opportunities for as many pupils as possible to participate in music, including concert performances, church services and local events. Gifted/talented vocalists and instrumentalists often perform solos in our school plays/concerts.

SEND

Our music curriculum is designed to enable pupils across the year groups to have the opportunity to play a variety of musical instruments. During each academic year, the pupils receive whole-class instrument teaching of the ocarina. The Academy offers pupils the opportunity to learn to play a range of other instruments including the drums, keyboard, piano and the guitar. The Academy engages outside agencies, including local authority's music service, to perform this function.

Vocabular

Key vocabulary is an important part of all our learning in music. We introduce key vocabulary and define it with the pupils. Once introduced, pupils are encouraged to use it in discussions and appraisals.

Values

Resilience – we persevere to sing with precision, compose with imagination and perform with accuracy. We persevere when playing an instrument, independently or in front of others.

Reflection – We provide opportunities for pupils to appraise their own and each other's singing, instrument and composition work. Reflective skills are developed through listening to, appreciating and responding to a wide range of high-quality live and recorded music drawn from different traditions and from great composers and musicians.

Responsibility - Pupils are expected to take care of all the musical instruments.

Respect - We encourage pupils to respect other pupils' musical ability, expression and opinions in music. Tolerance of music of different traditions and cultures are also expected.

Relationships - Pupils learn how to work effectively with each other often needing to take a leader/follower role.
