Reading

We sometimes think that as our children begin to read words more fluently that we can let them 'get on' with their reading. This year is the National Year of Reading. For our children, regular reading still matters—aim for a little every day, whether your child reads independently, aloud to you, or you take turns. We can show interest by talking about the story, asking what they think might happen next, or how a character feels, which helps build understanding and enjoyment. Encourage choice by letting your child pick books that match their interests, even if they seem "too easy" or are part of a series—fluency grows through practice and pleasure. Model reading yourself, praise effort rather than speed, and keep reading a relaxed, positive experience rather than a test. Each of these ideas, not to be all done at once, make a difference to the development of children's reading.

Celeste Express is packed full of amazing illustrations and lots of adventure and humour. Celeste Express is the ideal story for reluctant readers.



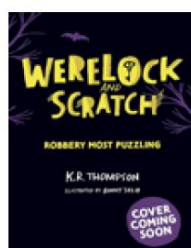
